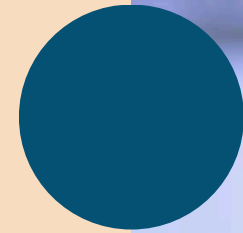
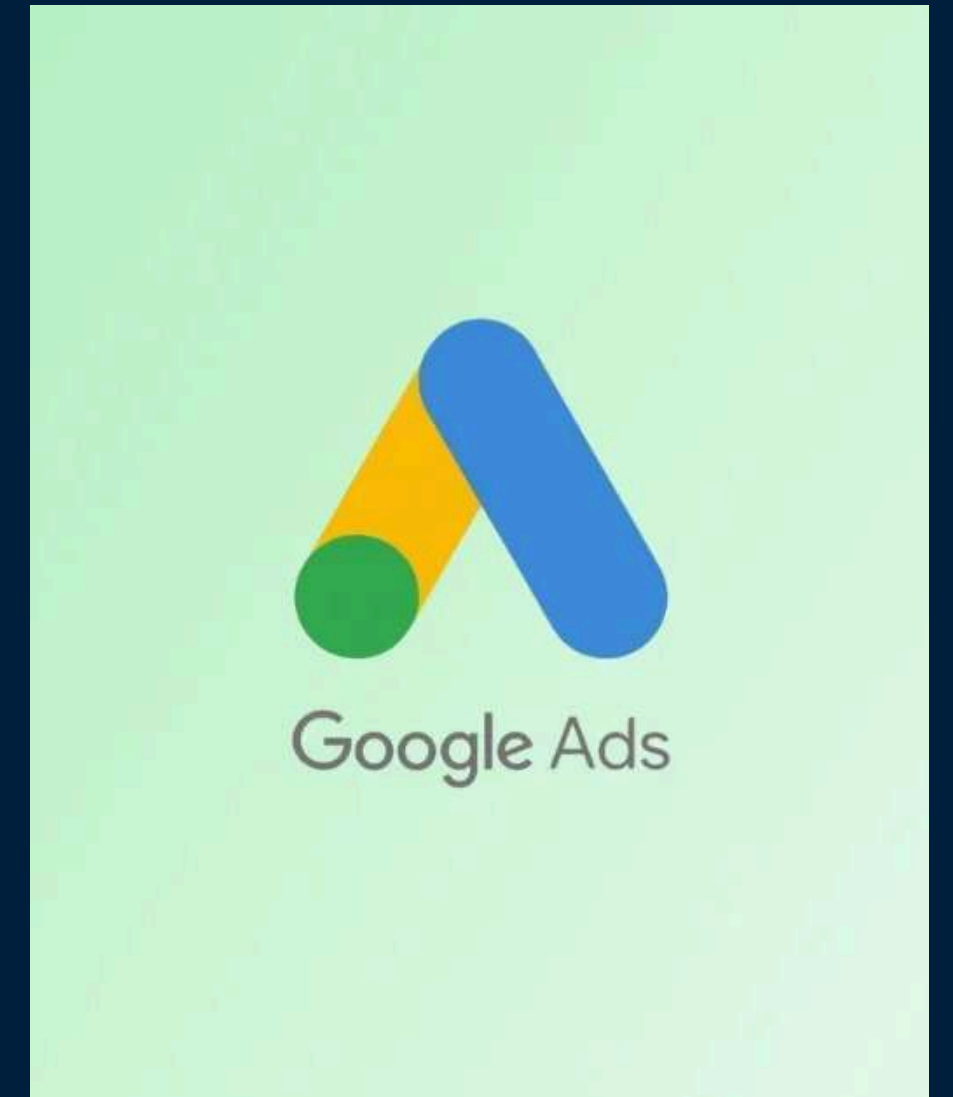

Smart bidding and auto-applied settings are being pushed by default, limiting manual optimization and nudging advertisers toward higher budgets.

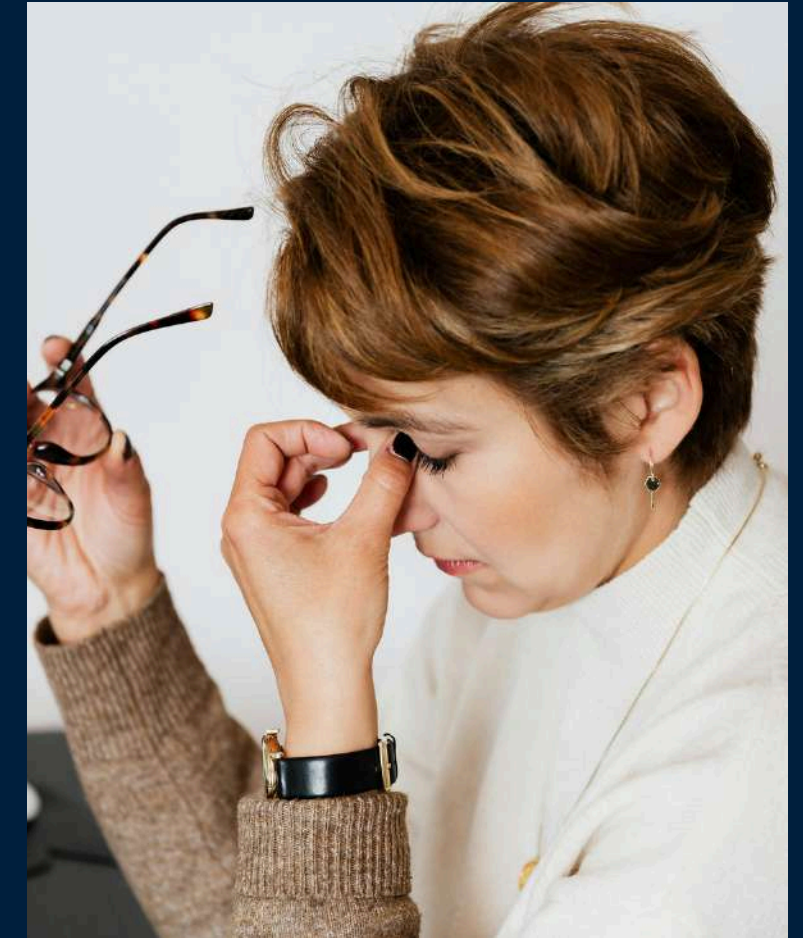
